Town of Milford REGULATIONS —OF THE— Board of Health

The unjoined regulations, marked "repealed," mean that until further notice they are suspended, to take effect at 12:01 a. m., Sunday, Oct. 29, 1918. All others are in full force and effect.

REGULATIONS.

1. All public and private schools within the limits of the town are hereby ordered closed.

Repealed.

2. No person shall conduct or open to the public any theatre, moving picture house, dance hall or any public entertainment, to which is admitted any person under 15 years of age.

3. All public services in churches and chapels are hereby forbidden.

Repealed.

4. All bar rooms, saloons, ice cream parlors, soda fountains and public drinking places are hereby ordered closed, and no person shall sell or dispense drink or ice cream in any bar room, saloon, store or other public drinking place.

Repealed.

5. All pool rooms and bowling alleys are hereby ordered closed, and no person shall conduct or open to the public any pool room or bowling alley.

Repealed.

6. All public funerals are hereby forbidden.

In force.

7. All specially advertised public sales of goods are hereby forbidden.

In force.

8. All public indoor meetings, except with the written permission of the board, are hereby forbidden.

The infant whose death was mentioned in yesterday's list of victims, was Antonio Furciniti, two-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Giuseppe Furciniti, 23 Mt. Pleasant street.

Early this morning two more deaths were added to the toll, which now reaches 53.

The latter two are: Urbano Blagotti, 26 years old, 24 Genoa avenue.

Angelo Bolzani, 28 years old, Braggville, who leaves a wife and children.

MILFORD CALLS OFF ITS EPIDEMIC BAN

At a special meeting last night in the office of Judge J. C. Lynch of the Public Safety committee and the board of health, the two local organizations having charge of the successful campaign against the spread of the grip epidemic here, it was decided to lift the ban against public gatherings in a measure.

It was decided to allow regular religious services on Sunday, with the suggestion, however, that they be made brief.

Theatres will be allowed to open on Monday, with the restriction for the present that no persons under 18 years of age can be admitted.

Ice cream parlors, saloons, bowling alleys, etc., will all open on Monday.

Owing to the fact that the disease has had an unusual effect on children, it was decided not to reopen the schools as yet, and for a similar reason juveniles are barred from the theatres.

LEND YOUR AUTO TO VOLUNTEER NURSES

Atty. A. B. Cenedella, speaking for the committee on Public Safety and the board of health, today asked The Daily News to again call attention to the dire need of more automobiles to transport nurses about town on their visits to people ill with influenza.

Atty. Cenedella stated that it seems to be the same few who give their machines every day, and that the committee feels that others would gladly loan their cars if they but realized the great need of autos.
